Donations still needed to aid southern W. Va.

More than 950 donors have contributed more than \$225,000 to the WVU Foundation for flood relief efforts in southern West Virginia. The donations followed the issuance of a challenge by alumnus Ken Kendrick, a southern West Virginia native, who said he would match dollar-for-dollar each donation up to \$500,000.

Many WVU students and families were affected by the storms and high water, leaving some homeless and others with extensive property loss.

The WVU Extension Service, the university's lead outreach agency, seeks donations for relief efforts as it continues providing assistance to residents in areas impacted by the flooding.

In 2013, the Kenneth D. and Carolyn T. Gray Emergency Fund was created through the WVU Foundation, to assist current students who experience a sudden financial hardship, including natural disasters such as flooding.

Kendrick, of Paradise Valley, Ariz., is managing general partner of Major League Baseball's Arizona Diamondbacks. He graduated from WVU in 1965 with a bachelor's degree in business administration. West Virginia Lottery Acting Director John Myers introduced Robert Lane, of Fairmont, as West Virginia's second \$1 million Powerball winner — within two weeks — at a press conference Monday. The lucky ticket, which matched five numbers from last Wednesday's drawing, was purchased from the East Park Mart, in Fairmont.

Lane purchased the ticket July 4. Friday, he returned to the store location and saw that someone had bought the winning ticket from that location. He asked the cashier to give him a copy of the winning numbers to compare with his ticket at home. He had his daughter check the numbers, she realized he had matched all five of the first five numbers for the

winning ticket. "You work hard all of your [life], then it's hard to let this just sink in," said Lane, who is still in shock, and said this is something he wishes he could share with his parents. Lane and his family are considering their options. His wife would like a small farm, "something where he can have some cattle." Lane also brought his nephew, Ricky, along to enjoy in the excitement, after which they plan to go fishing and may take some trips out west to big game hunt. Lane oc-

asionally plays the lottery, but more so, "when it gets over a hundred million." He has used birthdays in the past for his numbers, however, this lucky one was chosen with the easy pick.

Home confinement saves county cash

KINGWOOD — Preston County saved \$19,849 during the last month as a result of the home confinement program.

Home Confinement Officer Ron Bolyard reported the county had 401 saved beds in the last month. Each saved bed is one day one person was not in jail. The county pays \$49.50 per day for each person it has in the regional jail.

The 14 people on home confinement is less than the usual number, which is typically more than 20, Bolyard said.

PRESTON COUNTY COMMISSION

In the past, the Preston County Commission has shown concern over the amount charged to those in the home confinement program, which is left to a judge's discretion and can cost anywhere from \$1-\$10 per day.

"We needed to keep an eye on how many people we're keeping in there, and then we need to keep an eye on what the judges are making these people pay," Commissioner Craig Jennings said.

Unless there is a demonstra-

tion of financial need, those on home confinement are typically charged \$10 per day, Commissioner Don Smith said.

In other discussions, during County Administrator Kathy Mace's report, commissioners learned the county ended the 2015-'16 fiscal year with \$18,291 more in coal severance taxes than anticipated. The excess money will be put in the maintenance and repair budget.

"We do have some projects around, so that will help with the sidewalks and stuff like that," Smith said.

WVU names Pfeifer as new registrar

Provost promotes interim, no search

WVU Provost Joyce McConnell named Aimée Pfeifer the university registrar effective July 1.

Pfeifer has been with the university since 2009, and interim registrar for nearly a year.

"Aimée has tremendous expertise in the many functions a registrar performs," McConnell said. "Perhaps even more importantly, she is committed to a 'people-first' approach in the Office of the Registrar, which is critical as the West Virginia University student body grows and diversifies."

Pfeifer's annual salary will be \$135,000. As interim, she made \$110,000.

Pfeifer joined WVU as the associate registrar for student services, responsible for the maintenance of student records, in 2010. She previously worked in the registrar's office at the University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, and at Capital University, in Ohio, and has more than 10 years of experience in the field.

"I am excited to continue the great work of the Office of the Registrar at WVU," Pfeifer said. "We have a fantastic team in place, all dedicated to maintaining the highest standards for the institution while providing exceptional service to our students."

The Office of the Provost did not conduct a search for the registrar position but appointed Pfeifer directly. "At this time, WVU needs a registrar who has a strong fundamental sense of the role of the registrar; has the ability to work as an engaged team player; and, has tremendously nuanced institutional knowledge. Thus, an internal hire makes very good sense, since we already have such a person at WVU," said Vice Provost Russ Dean. "We are confident that Aimée will continue to lead her team in providing the excellent student services that the Office of the Registrar already offers."

North Korea vows to end diplomat communication channel with U. S.

SEOUL, South Korea — North Korea said Monday it will end a diplomatic com-

munication channel with the United States and hinted at harsher punishment for Americans detained in the country in retaliation for

U.S. sanctions that target leader Kim Jong Un.

The U.S. government last week imposed penal-

ties on Kim and 10 other top officials for alleged human rights abuses. North Korea is already sanctioned because of its nuclear

weapons program, but it was the first time that Kim was personally sanctioned.

On Monday, the North's

state media said it told the United States it will terminate contact through a U.N. channel in New York that allowed diplomats to communicate.

The commission has remained skeptical of the state's estimates on coal severance tax receipts. Though the state estimated the county to receive \$40,000 in severance tax for the 2016-'17 fiscal year, the

commission has only budgeted \$25,000.

"We'd rather have the extra money so we can say, 'Now we can do this,' instead of having to go, 'we have to fire somebody,'" Smith said.
